WHO WE ARE

Telethon Speech & Hearing (TSH) is a proud Western Australian success story. The only one of its kind in Australia, TSH brings together a range of interconnected supports for children with hearing loss and/or speech delays and disorders to support them and their families. Our models integrate service delivery unparalleled in the country to support children to hear, speak, learn and play.

Unique in our approach TSH provides a range of diagnostic, therapeutic and educational services for children with hearing, speech and language needs. We take a whole of life approach to supporting children and their families so they can have the most fulfilled lives possible.

We do this as a not-for-profit, charity, independent school and NDIS provider.

OUR BACKGROUND

TSH originated in 1966 by a group of parents who had great hopes for the future for their profoundly deaf children. These parents started their own school with five students, no premises and little money or experience to pursue the very best oral education for their children. From these humble beginnings, TSH has grown to become a centre of excellence and is the only place in WA that provides education, therapies and audiology services all in one location.

OUR SERVICES

For Children in Perth

Delivered to meet the needs of every family that accesses our services, TSH offers a range of flexible, innovative services for children in the metropolitan area of Perth including:

- An early intervention program that helps children aged 0-5 with a hearing loss learn how to speak using group and one-on-one therapy sessions
- » A school support program for students who are deaf or hard of hearing at a network of nine primary and secondary schools
- » A specifically designed speech and language program for children aged 2-7 who have speech and language delays or disorders
- » Paediatric audiology services
- » Speech pathology clinics
- » Psychology clinics
- » Occupational therapy clinics

For Children in Regional WA

Recognising that children in regional WA have difficulty accessing the services available to others in the metropolitan area TSH provides services to children through:

- » Our valued partnership with Chevron, our capacity-building Ear Health Program in the West Pilbara for children in various communities
- » The TSH Wheatbelt Clinics in a number of Wheatbelt towns
- » Teletherapy supports for children with a hearing loss anywhere across WA

For Families






Post School Destinations

In 2017 we proudly celebrated 50 years of inspirational service to families with children who have hearing impairments or speech and language delay. The determination showed by our founding families, teachers, supporters and benefactors has shaped the work we do today. CEO REPORT

2017 was an extraordinary year to commence my role as Chief Executive Officer at Telethon Speech & Hearing. Celebrating our 50th anniversary, connecting with other organisations and learning about all of the wonderful services we provide have been highlights. But seeing the outcomes our teams help create is nothing short of inspirational and hearing the stories of many of our families has been extremely humbling.



Celebrating 50 Years

Celebrating our 50th anniversary injected a new level of energy into TSH, with a number of occasions for us to connect with key people who have shaped this impressive organisation. Being able to connect with some of our first families, our first teacher and first Principal, along with some of our early students made all of us realise how courageous they were and how important it is we keep their legacy going in the way they intended.

Recognition for a TSH Staff Member

Our school programs continue to remain shining lights in Western Australia, if not across the country, in the support of children with hearing impairments or speech and language delays or disorders. Our ethos sees us implement an integrated multidisciplinary team approach to supporting children, so it is not often that our team members accept nominations for awards. In 2017, one of our Talkabout 5 teachers, Luisa Mander, was nominated for a National Excellence in Teaching Awards and now has been shortlisted as a Finalist. We are extremely proud of Luisa's achievements and wish her all the best in the upcoming finals.

Part of the Pilbara

Often unheralded is the work we do in the Pilbara. I have been impressed by the outcomes we are getting through our partnership with Chevron with a reduction of middle ear health disease in some communities. For example, in Roebourne we have seen the prevalence of otitis media in children under seven years of age drop from 51.7% in 2011 to 33.3% in 2016. The role of connecting with community by our team based in Karratha, along with the support they receive from our wonderfully skilled audiologists, is making significant improvements in a number of remote communities.

Power of Speech - Advocacy in Canberra

First in March and then in August, Telethon Speech & Hearing travelled to Canberra to continue its advocacy for change in government policy, highlighting the work we do with children of all ages with hearing impairments. I was fortunate to be accompanied by three impressive young people and their families. Each spoke with such enthusiasm and commitment, all highlighting the outcomes we are able to get when we work with them and their families.

Our future is full of promise but there are many challenges ahead. The implementation of the NDIS, tightening fiscal policies from government and a more competitive market for donor support all add to the challenges we face. REGULATORY FRAMEWORK

TSH is an independent organisation that is established as a company limited by guarantee incorporated under the Corporations Act 2001 and regulated by ASIC.

TSH is also a charity registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission (ACNC). At the State level we are registered under the Charities Act 2013 and operate in accordance with the Charitable Collections Act and other legislation in Western Australia. TSH is a Public Benevolent Institution and is endorsed to access GST Concession.

Our Directors are appointed in accordance with good governance practices based on their skills and abilities in areas deemed to support the organisation's strategic development. Directors carry out functions according to our Constitution, the Corporations Act, ACNC legislation and other relevant State and Commonwealth legislation. The role of the Board is to ensure that TSH's mission and vision are achieved and effective governance is in place.

TSH also operates in accordance with its registration as an independent school with AISWA, as a NDIS provider and as a disability provider with the Western Australian Disability Services Commission.



CHATTERBOX An early intervention program for children with a hearing loss

1 in 1000 children are born with a hearing impairment, doubling to 1 in 500 by the time they reach school age. If left undetected or untreated, it has a negative impact on the child's speech, language, listening, motor skills, cogitation, attachment and social regulation.

Our Program

We help children with hearing loss learn to speak through using a listening and spoken language approach, providing them with the best possible chance to lead a fulfilled life in our community. We do so by supporting and empowering families (95% of whom have normal hearing) to create the best possible life for their child – all in one place.

Recognising that devices alone are not enough, our unique model is the only one in Western Australia where children aged 0-5 years can access support from a truly multidisciplinary team of experts (Auditory Verbal Therapists, Teachers, Audiologists, Speech Pathologists, Psychologists, Occupational Therapists, and Specialist Education Assistants) in the same place to improve their hearing, listening, communication, speech and educational outcomes.

Meet Leo

Leo Ellis and his family joined Telethon Speech & Hearing in February 2017 following a late diagnosis of a hearing loss, assumed to be progressive in nature. Leo initially passed his Newborn Hearing Screening and suffered with ongoing middle ear pathology. Following grommet insertion, Leo was diagnosed with a sensori-neural hearing loss in February 2016 and fitted with hearing aids aged 2 years.

Leo began early intervention services as part of the Chatterbox program at Telethon Speech & Hearing in February 2017. Leo made little progress with his hearing aids, but his family persisted with therapy and started to see small gains in his attempts at communication. Further testing indicated that Leo had a severe-profound hearing loss in his left ear and in July 2017 he received a Cochlear Implant.

Leo's progress with his cochlear implant was incredible. He took to his new device immediately and did not want to take it off. He began turning to sounds and voice straight away and by the second week of using his cochlear implant, Leo was attempting to imitate sounds that he had heard. Now 10 months later, Leo is using 2-3 word phrases when speaking such as "my turn", "green car", "mummy help me". He continues to make incredible gains in his listening, speaking and communication.

Leo has received support from TSH Chatterbox transdisciplinary team. This involved individual and joint sessions with Speech Pathologists, Occupational Therapists, Audiologists and attendance at therapy groups run by Speech Pathologists, Occupational Therapists and Psychologists. His intervention occurs at home, grandparents' home, therapy group and therapy rooms at TSH.

Leo is now 3 years old and enjoying interacting with others. His progress and achievement can be accredited to the incredible effort put in by his parents Natalie and Ray, as well as lovely involvement from his grandparents. This family is to be commended for their ongoing commitment and dedication to the program and support they offer Leo in helping him to develop his spoken language and communication skills. "It is a privilege to work with Leo and his family and support them in helping him to be the best that he can be", Leo's case manager, Candice, Speech Therapist & Auditory Verbal Therapist, says.

OUTPOST A school based program helping children with a hearing loss to learn

Studying in schools for children with hearing loss is not always easy. Their continuing need to develop speech and language skills, coupled with the extraordinary focus required to hear and interpret teachers and classmates, students with hearing loss can quickly fall behind if they don't get the support they need. That is where TSH steps in, partnering with leading schools across Perth.

DID YOU KNOW?

Our multi-disciplinary team consist of leading teachers of the deaf, psychologists, speech pathologists, audiologists, occupational therapists, notetakers and educational assistants.

Our Program

We run a comprehensive in-school support program for students with hearing loss from kindergarten to Year 12 at our partner primary and secondary schools. The program is designed for students who use oral communication to maximise their active participation in mainstream schools.

Our multi-disciplinary team consist of leading teachers of the deaf, psychologists, speech pathologists, audiologists, occupational therapists, notetakers and educational assistants. Students have full access to the school curriculum in each location and may graduate to a full range of post-school options including TAFE, University, VET, and other pathways.

Meet Christopher

My name is Christopher Turner, aged 14 and I attend year 9 at Aquinas College. I was Hearing impaired at birth and was equipped with hearing aids very early on, for both right and left ears. When I was 17 months I was fitted with my first hearing aids, which would be the beginning of a long chain of different models, different types, different colours of hearing aids. I vividly remember my first hearing aids being bright orange, looking back I often chuckle when I try to imagine myself wearing these bright orange. Over the course of many years my hearing aids have had numerous ups and downs, new models and versions being highlights of my listening journey while on the other hand I've experienced my puppy chewing my hearing aids on several occasions.

It was around 2014 when my doctors decided that my loss in my right ear had become so severe that I would be fitted with a cochlear implant, and I do have to admit I was reluctant at first but I eventually agreed with their terms. June 2014 would see me finally receiving the implant and processor, a monumental time in the history of my life so far.

Having a hearing impairment is obviously going to be a bit tougher on me than others, everyday it's almost like I'm handicapped in all aspects of life. But with effort and focus I can learn to overcome these boundaries, a fine example being sport. Ever since I was young I've been an avid soccer enthusiast, of course it was challenging at first particularly because I was a weak link in my teams line of communication. But I learnt at a young age that I have to apply myself and learn how to utilise my hearing aid and cochlear alike to realise my full potential on the football pitch. Fast forward to nowadays, I'm playing soccer 5 times a week and one of the most talented players at both school and in my club.

Another struggle that I face on a near daily basis is school. A learning environment that is always hustling and bustling filled with noise everywhere was a big step up for, certainly moving into high school. I felt so intimated by everyone and my fear of being put down and letting others down because of my hearing loss was prevalent. As the days, weeks and months progressed I settled down and learnt that if I was to fit in I would just need to be myself, and the reality was that I was a hearing impaired person. Many thanks to my hearing teachers, namely Mrs Marshall and Mrs Scott, and peers helping me out in these times. I found quickly after that people would accept me and life at school wasn't that hard, and although I do face many challenges in day to day life at school it doesn't make me any different. Because life isn't about what we are, it's about who we are and how we react to the ongoing difficulties we face.

TALKABOUT A school program helping children with speech or language delays and disorders

Research suggests that speech and language delays affect up to 25% of children. But the system available to parents is disjointed, not well defined, difficult to navigate and can be costly.

Too many children with speech and language delays are falling through the cracks, missing out on essential supports or delaying access to them. A lack of access results in life-long impacts on a child's ability to engage in education, communicate, socialise, gain employment and contribute to society.

Our Program

TSH's Talkabout program is where children with speech and language delays and their families get the support they need in one location. It is the only place in Australia where children from 2-5 years can access support from a truly integrated team of experts (Teachers, Audiologists, Speech Pathologists, Psychologists, Occupational Therapists and Specialist Education Assistants) to improve their speech, listening, communication and educational outcomes in a play-based classroom setting.

Our leadership in this field sees us delivering:

- » Age appropriate language playgroups for children under 3 years old
- » A multifaceted kindergarten program focused on language development
- » A pre-primary program that shares the child with their mainstream school
- » Literacy classes for children in Years 1 and 2
- » Teacher education programs
- » Materials for families to understand what the age appropriate norms for speech and language development

2017 saw the introduction of our first Literacy Tutoring program for 6 and 7 year olds. Focusing on the development of their language skills, the program provided a synthetic phonics approach to support reading and spelling development for 14 students.

Meet Kiki

When she was a toddler, Kiki's parents, Rebecca and Sheldon began to notice that she was tripping over a lot of things. A specialist at Kiki's daycare also observed similar difficulties with her motor planning and recommended a Paediatric assessment. At two and a half years old, Kiki was diagnosed with Motor Planning Dyspraxia and developmental delays in both her motor and language skills.

Reflecting on that time of early diagnosis, Rebecca said, "I didn't know what this meant for my child, I was afraid for her and there was a real period of adjustment, but I knew it was important not to stop. I took a day or two then thought – right, what can I do to help, how can I ensure she doesn't get left behind and continues to progress?" Rebecca began to read and research everything she needed to know, and identified the importance of early intervention. It was at this time, she also found the Talkabout Program, at Telethon Speech & Hearing.

A week after Rebecca's initial phone call inquiring about the program, Kiki began in Talkabout 4, "Michelle [the Family Liaison Officer] said, can you start next week? And I said, done!" From the moment Kiki joined the Talkabout program, Rebecca and Sheldon felt that they were no longer alone. Rebecca described the support at TSH as a 'fabric that was woven together' to support families - from the team of professionals who work alongside parents as advocates for their children to the community of other families in the program who are sharing a similar journey and experience.

Following Talkabout 4, Kiki continued to Talkabout 5 and is now currently enrolled in the Talkabout Literacy program for Year 2 students. Rebecca and Sheldon are so proud of the gains Kiki has made, "We have seen Kiki go from strength to strength!" They attribute a lot of her success to the Talkabout Program - the individualised support the teachers and specialists provided Kiki, the psychology support Kiki and her family were able to access, the parent resources Rebecca loaned from TSH's library, the parent information nights and sessions, and the community Kiki and her family connected with.

Five years on from her diagnosis, Kiki's Motor Planning Dyspraxia has resolved – she is now a happy, active girl who enjoys weekly gymnastics classes, basketball, and running around with her family and friends at the playground. Rebecca attributes the development of Kiki's motor planning skills to early intervention and, in addition to one on one therapy, the OT component of the Talkabout program – which Kiki loved.

Rebecca believes the groundwork laid in Talkabout 4 and 5, and now in the Talkabout Literacy program have provided Kiki with a strong foundation for learning. Targeted goals and celebration of her successes now means Kiki is a confident learner. Rebecca and Sheldon are so proud of their daughter, who now loves to read and write. She is "persistent in her learning and a confident kid who takes pride in everything she does."

AUDIOLOGY Providing hearing support services for all

Hearing loss is the third most common physical condition facing all Australians, 1 in 6 Australians will experience hearing impairment during their life. The impact of communication, socialisation and employment can be devastating, not only for people who experience hearing loss but also their families and loved ones are significantly impacted.

At TSH our model of support recognises the impact hearing loss can have on the family. Our services are designed not only to provide excellent diagnostic and audiological services but also to provide the support and care to the whole family as they work through the impact of hearing loss.

Audiology for Children

TSH Audiology offers a range of services for children of all ages, from infant diagnostic testing, to hearing screening and hearing tests to Cochlear mapping and support.

In 2017 TSH focused on connecting our strengths in our Audiology services to provide access to hearing services in schools as part of our bus service, and have planned to support innovative programs with other community service organisations. TSH was proud to receive a grant from Aurizon to conduct screening and testing for children from low socioeconomic backgrounds to limit the need for them to be added to the long waitlists for public services.

Audiology for Families

Recognising the need to have hearing supports for families can often extend beyond children, TSH provides services for the whole family. We provide diagnostic audiology, hearing aid and other assistive listening device evaluation, fitting and management to pensioners, veterans and other private referrals.

TSH Audiology services were provided at Wembley Clinic, Cockburn Clinic and Ellenbrook Clinic.

In 2017 TSH also facilitated lip reading classes and provided 12 talks to raise awareness of hearing related issues in the community.

TSH Audiologists are WorkCover WA accredited.




OUR IMPACT IN REGIONAL WA Addressing Otitis Media

Aboriginal children have ten times the prevalence of otitis media than non-Aboriginal children.

If left unchecked, this often leads to hearing loss and a delay in speech development which can affect a child's performance in class. Long term, this can lead to unemployment, social exclusion and incarceration, as exemplified by a study conducted in the Northern Territory which illustrates that 93% of Aboriginal prisoners have a hearing loss.

Telethon Speech & Hearing runs two programs to help address otitis media in regional WA:



Pilbara Ear Health Program

In partnership with Chevron, TSH has pioneered a collaborative approach by conducting hearing screening in all primary schools in West Pilbara followed by audiology and nurse practitioner clinics to triage children who require further diagnosis, primary health care, and referral to specialist ear, nose and throat (ENT) services.

TSH Wheatbelt and Newman Clinics

With thanks to Rural Health West, TSH provides a model that connects our Audiologists and Nurse Practitioners to provide important ear health and other services that are severely lacking in areas of Western Australia's Wheatbelt region.





Meet Libron, 3 years old



Libron is an extremely active three year old with a smile that melts your heart. In his short life, he has had to attend so many different medical appointments; we cannot remember when Libron was first referred to Chevron Ear Health.

What was memorable though was the consistent professionalism and engagement of Amelia in the Karratha branch and the Ear Health team. After being made aware that Libron had mild hearing loss due to the fluid behind his ear drums, Libron was recommended to get grommets in both ears to release the fluid.

Libron went to the Hedland Health Campus for his operation and got to meet the Starlight team and play his favourite activity – bubbles. He went in for the surgery and by the time his foster dad got to see him in recovery, he was sitting up in bed and had nearly finished his ice-cream and was about to start his jelly.






