SHOWCASING OUR MULTI-DISCIPLINARY APPROACH

Earlier this term, we undertook renovations throughout the centre and moved our clinical staff - including Speech Pathologists, Psychologist, Teachers, and Occupational Therapists - from the Crommelin building to the Bendat building. AUSKICK HALF-TIME GAME

This August, the WA Football Commission and AFL invited students who are deaf or have a hearing loss to participate in an Auskick half-time game at the newly opened Optus Stadium.

Open to students aged 6-12 from TSH and School of Special Education Needs - Sensory (SSEN-S), the event was a real collaboration between everyone involved, including: TSH, SSEN-S, the Australian Deafness Council, WA Deaf Society, and WA Foundation For Deaf Children. Representatives from these organisations worked together to provide this unforgettable experience for all students.

The special day started at 11:30am with a training run at TSH. Everyone then caught buses to the Stadium. The buzz in the changeroom was electric as students were put in to their teams, allocated coaches, met one of the Dockers players and chatted amongst each other.

Then onto the field they ran! What a sight seeing 48 young Aussies running around and kicking goals in front of 50,000 spectators!

There were students who had played football before and some who had never played. It was wonderful to see students from all organisations playing so well together as it was the first time many of them had met. It was also fantastic to see so many girls taking to the field!

After the game, everyone caught the buses back to TSH for a Sausage Sizzle and trophy presentation. Each participant was presented with a football, state jumper and comemorative trophy.

Events like this that bring different causes and children together are extremely important. It is so important for all to work with each other to support our students to develop their sense of belonging.

GET TO KNOW OUR TEAM PT. 5

YURIKO KISHIDA, RESEARCH COORDINATOR

With a multi-disciplinary team, there are many specialists and team members involved in making sure your child develops and grows in a thriving environment.

Here is some insight from Yuriko Kishida (MEd, MSpecEd, PhD; Adjunct Fellow, Macquarie University), our hardworking and highly qualified(!) Research Coordinator.

ABOUT MY ROLE AT TSH:

I manage research and evaluations with the program leaders and staff, facilitate joint research projects with universities and other research organisations. I also conduct the annual family survey. I have the privilege of working across programs.

WHAT PROMPTED YOU TO PURSUE STUDY/RESEARCH IN EDUCATION AND SPECIAL EDUCATION?

I was a general education teacher and became interested in how I could better support children with additional needs. I studied further in special education and learned the importance of using research and data for better educational outcomes for every child. I worked in an early intervention program as a special education teacher and a researcher, and I loved it!

I AM CURRENTLY WORKING ON...

Writing a research paper summarizing the findings on conversational turn taking between children with a hearing loss and their parents. I am also planning our research projects for the next few years with the TSH leaders and our external collaborators. In addition, data collection is under way for a couple of our collaborative projects (Telethon Kids Institute - Social and emotional wellbeing for students with a hearing loss; HEARing CRC/University of Queensland – Tele intervention) and I am really looking forward to seeing the data.

3 COMMON GOALS STUDENTS/ FAMILIES LIKE TO SET FOR THEMSELVES ARE...

Goals depend on individual families, and children's needs. What I can say is that over the years, confidence, improved communication skills and social interactions are the outcomes that TSH families frequently indicate as the most significant for their children.

MY FAVOURITE SOUNDS...

Lapping of waves at a beach, and our cat purring. I find both calming.

TSH RESEARCH COLLABORATIONS

eHEALTH FOR FAMILY-CENTRED EARLY INTERVENTION FOR CHILDREN WITH HEARING LOSS AND THEIR FAMILIES

- In collaboration with the HEARing CRC reseachers, TSH has developed a tool that is designed to support families in making informed decision about their children's intervention delivery format (in-person/teleintervention). Currently the tool is being tested.

MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING OF STUDENTS WITH HEARING LOSS -

Together with the Telethon Kids Institute, online resources have been developed to help students, families and mainstream teachers as part of this study. Some of our Outpost students, families and their mainstream schools are currently trialing the resources.

THE IMPACT OF MOTOR SPEECH INTERVENTION ON INFANTS WITH A MOTOR SPEECH DISORDER

- Led by Dr Roslyn Ward (Perth's Children's Hospital), babbling/ speech interventions are being researched. Roslyn and Yuriko are also working on a future project in the area of OT and speech/language delays/ disorders.

POWER OF SPEECH

On August 18, Telethon Speech & Hearing held its 29th annual **Power Of Speech** (POS) awards.

Twenty-three students across nine Outpost units got up on stage to make presentations on a topic of their choice to a packed auditorium. We had 200 seats set up but had to put in a couple of extra rows to cater for the number of people who attended!

For the event, each student prepares a speech of up to three minutes in length. They are evaluated by a panel of judges who look for three things:

- 1. How interesting the presentation was;
- 2. How easy was it to understand; and
- How well did the speaker communicate with the audience.

We had six students who presented an item for the first time this year and the highest number of Year 1 and 2 participants than ever before. It will be great to watch them progress each year. I'm sure they will end up very competent public speakers by the time they finish with POS in in five years' time.

This year's MCs were our very own Teacher of the Deaf, Melissa Lewis and Outpost Alumni, Grace Fassho. Both did a fantastic job leading through the programme of the day.

THE POWER OF TURN TAKING

LANGUAGE TIPS TO TRY AT HOME

Listening to lots of different language is great for language development but new research has identified that it's **taking turns in conversation** that makes the biggest impact!

A new study has shown that the more children participate in back-and-forth interactions with their caregivers, the more activity they have in the part of the brain responsible for language production and processing. The study also showed a strong connection between the number of turns children take in conversation and the scores they receive on standardized language tests [1,2]. The more children are involved in back-and-forth exchanges, the greater the impact on their language skills.

WHAT MAKES BACK-AND-FORTH INTERACTIONS SO POWERFUL?

There's a lot children learn when they're involved in back-and-forth conversations that they couldn't learn if they just listened to someone else speak. This comparison chart shows just some of the advantages of conversation.

GET TO KNOW OUR TEAM PT. 6

BETHANY NEBEL, SPEECH PATHOLOGIST

MY ROLE AT TSH

I work as a Speech Pathologist in our Chatterbox Program for children aged 0-5 with hearing loss. I work one-on-one and in a group setting with children and their family to support their speech, language, listening and interaction development. This year, I have also started working in TSH's private Speech Pathology clinic one day a week. It is a privilege to journey along with families through times that can be incredibly challenging.

THE MOST COMMON QUESTION I GET ASKED IS...

Why do babies need Speech Pathology if they're not talking yet?

My answer to that is, learning to use speech and language is a very tricky thing for children to do and it starts from day dot! There are many things parents can be doing to help their child develop and flourish, even before the first word.

MY FAVOURITE ACTIVITY/TOY TO USE IN SESSIONS IS...

I am a huge fan of play-dough! For something that is really easy to make, I can use it to target almost any goal - and kids love it!

My other top picks would be bubbles, Duplo and Giggle Wiggle.

I RECENTLY ATTENDED A...

Personal development day on parent coaching presented by the Department of Communities – Disability Services. Equipping and empowering families is something that, as a TSH team, we work hard to do. What the day highlighted to me is that our families are experts in their children and my role as a therapist is to support them with information and encouragement as they find creative solutions to the difficulties their child faces.

I FIND IT INVIGORATING TO SEE...

Families that I work with become more knowledgable and confident in supporting their child's difficulties. That, and the strength of these families are incredibly inspiring and encouraging.

MY FAVOURITE SOUND IS...

I adore listening to and making music, which was one of the original reasons I wanted to work with the hearing loss population.

BETHANY'S FAVOURITE COOKED PLAY DOUGH RECIPE!

WHAT YOU NEED

- 4 cups flour
- 4 teaspoons cream of tartar
- 1 cup salt
- 4 cups water

A few drops of food colouring

2 tablespoons cooking oil

WHAT YOU NEED TO DO

Sift flour into a large cooking pot. Add cream of tartar and salt and mix to combine.

Combine water and a few drops of food colouring in a large jug.

Add oil and water to dry ingredients and stir to combine.

Continue stirring mixture over medium heat until the mixture thickens.

Remove dough from saucepan and allow to cool before use.

BEYOND THE FRIDGE DOOR

FROM THE SCHOOL OF EARLY LEARNING (SOEL)

Dr Marie Martin, Facilitator, Child Advocate and General Manager of EYE Training (SOEL's in house RTO),

There's something reassuring about a school bag that has colouring in and worksheets of letters, number or words. As parents, we can look at that page and know exactly what it is about. We gain confidence that our children are learning something, that the teachers are teaching something. And we can put it on the fridge as evidence for our friends and family to see. Or can we?

Let's stop and remember our own experience. What learning was on that piece of paper? What did it mean to us when that paper was put on the fridge door? Or if it wasn't? What really mattered: the paper or the warm glow of parental praise and pride?

At Schools of Early Learning we know that learning happens in people's brains. To learn something, we need to see it, do it, practise it and apply it. We need to know it, understand it, have the skills to do it, hold positive values about it and take responsible, thoughtful and appropriate action with it. Learning doesn't fit on a piece of paper, or on a fridge door. It's bigger than that.

Learning that excites us is learning we want to share. Our children speak excitedly about

their current investigations, using language such as 'transformation', 'connection', 'garden to plate' and 'sustainability'. These investigations continue over many months, growing, changing and challenging. There are always new ideas to explore, new thoughts to puzzle, new possibilities to create.

Children learn quickly what is important to us by what we pay attention to and what we ignore. Learning that matters to us can be hard to share. How can we explain the feeling of having a wonderful idea, of mastering a skill, of persisting at a task, of receiving a thank you because of our actions? Our children have 'a look': of amazement, surprise, concentration, pride. Sometimes 'the look' is connected with a drawing, piece of writing, a construction, a model or an installation.

What are your children excited about? Can you hear their learning? Are you proud of their growing knowledge, understanding, skills, attitudes and actions?

ABOUT THE SCHOOLS OF EARLY LEARNING





WELCOME TO OUR NEW NEIGHBOURS

THE WA DEAF SOCIETY JOINS US IN WEMBLEY!

We are very pleased to now have the WA Deaf Society become our new neighbours.

The WA Deaf Society has proudly been supporting deaf and hard of hearing Western Australians since 1921 and now have made the decision to locate alongside Telethon Speech & Hearing.

While it will mean little for our children and parents it does signify an important step in service delivery - it is the first time in Australia where a listening and spoken language organisation (TSH) has worked physically alongside a signing based organisation (WADS).

The WA Dear Society will be occupying the front part of the Crommelin building, with TSH retaining its sole use of the Chatterbox playgroup room, the

gym, and the parent parking for school pick-ups and drop-offs.

For parents accessing TSH it will mean no change - for parents accessing the entrance near the playground this will be no change from what you do now and for families who access the clinics or Audiology through the Bendat Community Centre you will still access those services in that building.

In terms of the services we provide, it also means no change. What it will do is now provide a "hub" for those seeking support from organisations specialising in helping people with hearing loss and their families.

We are looking forward to having the WA Deaf Society as our neighbours.

Family Trips

Family trips are all about spending family time. We can each enjoy a break in routine, distance from our usual troubles, and time to appreciate each other's company. Trips can be memorable and memorable means bang for the buck in terms of language and learning. When we talk about exciting things we enjoy talking even more and when we listen to exciting things we enjoy listening even more. Too often we focus on what needs to be learned, ask our children to say things that we think they should say and listen to what we think they should hear. When we




shift to talking and listening about what the child is excited about, we reinforce the listening-talking system that leads to your child adopting an active conversational stance. Your child will want to ask about more and eagerly listen to more. The more the listening goes in and the talking goes out, the greater and stronger his language will become.

To adapt the advice given for writing essays in school, when it comes to trips and outings it's best to "tell them what you are going to show them", "tell them", and then "tell them what you showed them". Before you go on a trip gather flyers, print pictures off of a website, create experience folders like the ones in the talkabout section of this website, take out picture books that show where you are going, involve your child in deciding what they need to pack, etc. There are great language opportunities in the "hype" phase leading up to a trip. You will prepare your child for success in listening while you are away by helping him to overlearn the words he will hear when he gets there. You will also prepare him by giving him a sense of the overall picture of what is happening: where he is in relation to home, what he will do in what order, when he will be coming home. The overall story of things to come and the mini scripts for each step in the vacation will help your child to understand what is being said to him. It will also help him to feel secure, knowing his place in the timeline.

While on your trip, remember to balance time for activites with time to talk and share. A busy schedule can rob us of the true purpose of vacation - family time. Become a collector. If you go on a streetcar save the transfers, if you go to the beach collect shells in a baggie, if you go to a hotel collect a flyer about the hotel, etc. These will be great items for talking about after your trip.

Once you are home it is time to print the digital photos, glue the collected items into a file folder, and reflect on a great trip. Remember to talk while the trip is still relevant. Cover your kitchen table with a clear plastic tablecloth (a hardware store can cut one for you) and place your trip photos on the table surface under the clear plastic. Now you can have lots of fun talking about the trip you had, and then about all the great trips you still want to take.

A FOND FAREWELL TO ONE OF OUR FIRST STUDENTS, JENNY CROMMELIN


This July, we bid farewell to a very special individual of our organisation - Jenny Crommelin, who passed away on 21 July 2018 at the age of 55.

Jenny was one of the first few students who enrolled in our centre back in 1966. Born with a disability including hearing loss and diagnosed with rheumatoid arthritis at a young age, Jenny learnt cued speech (a form of lip reading), to communicate with family and friends.

Her parents, Audrey and Terry Crommelin were incredible contributors and advocates for bringing the centre to its official school status the following year.

TSH had the pleasure of reuniting with Jenny and her first teachers, Vince McCudden and Marie Kormendy last year during our 50th year celebrations.

Jenny is well remembered for her outstanding humour and positive take on life. The following page details the immense effect Jenny's charm had on those around her, as retold by her late father Terry.





OUR JENNY

WORDS FROM A FATHER

"Jenny's deaf! She's deaf I tell vou.

"No Dear," was my wife's reply.
"When Jenny concentrates on her playing, she ignores everyone."

From the moment of my outburst, it was only a few hours before we both knew we had a deaf child.

Fear, horror-what do we do? Who do we consult? Who do we know who might help bring some resolution to this problem.

Was one of our children really deaf? My mind raced. How? Why? What had we done? What hadn't we done? These were just some of the questions that flooded in.

There was despair-a sense of helplessness. Possible solutions and the hopes that all parents have for their children, were obscured by the lack of knowing what it all meant. We didn't know anything about deafness.

Naturally, we sought the advice of doctors, hoping against hope that our fears were unfounded, but after several confirmations we settled down to the reality that Jenny was deaf.

I was looking at the possibility of a medical solution. But Jenny's deafness was more than that and I realised that with deafness comes a 'speaking' problem. Would she ever learn to talk? Was it possible?

Long investigations followed and our personal search for answers became a shared one. Other parents, grandparents and friends were drawn together and began to express their hopes and aspirations. They also felt there must be another way of teaching deaf children to talk.

So commenced, what was, the Speech and Hearing Centre (W.A.) Inc, and today, Telethon Speech & Hearing.

Jenny was our personal inspiration. She was no burden, no embarrassment. She was

Jenny. Every family needs a 'Jenny'. Life can be a selfish thing without one. A 'Jenny' brings friends and family together-draws and holds each to the other more strongly than can be imagined.

A 'Jenny' offers a challenge to any caring parent, grandparent, brother, sister or friend. It is a family challenge so badly needed in this selfish world today.

Deafness is not the end, but a beginning!

I say to those parents, "Don't feel sorry. There's no need for despair or self pity. There's a challenge in being deaf in being the parents of a deaf child, but there is a future and there are many who will offer you a hand along the way.

"Jenny came into our home and we were confused but, through her, our lives have been enriched. Yours will be also."
