Although newborn hearing screenings can detect hearing loss at birth, hearing loss can occur at any age.

Undiagnosed hearing and ear health problems can result in delays in communication, poor speech and language development, can have negative impacts on social relationships and in extreme cases, cause long-term damage to the ear and its functions.

This is why regular hearing checks are highly recommended for children.

Early diagnosis

Nearly 1 in 500 children will have permanent hearing loss by the time they reach school age.

By the time they have finished school, the average child will have endured three months of middle ear infections and associated hearing loss.

Don't let your child suffer as a result of undiagnosed hearing or ear health problems.

If you have a concern it is important to get quick access to further testing, diagnosis and early intervention services.

A simple check could make all the difference for you and your child.

Ear infections

Otitis Media ('glue ear') is the medical name for a middle ear infection. It is one of the most common childhood illnesses. Some children may experience frequent episodes of Otitis Media. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children are at much higher risk of Otitis Media and associated hearing loss.

Signs and symptoms:

- Cold symptoms (fever, cough, runny nose, fatique/grumpy)
- Sore ears or pulling ears
- Smelly ears
- Runny ears/pus
- Poor speech
- Misunderstanding instructions
- Poor school performance

A child may also have an ear infection without any symptoms at all.
